Who colonized the Philippines first? The Philippine Islands were discovered by Magellan in 1521, and claimed by Spain. The first successful settlements were made in 1565. Spain wanted to find an alternative route to the Moluccas that would circumvent the Portuguese. Also, the missionaries wanted to use the Philippines to spread Christianity in Asia, especially China.

What is the ancestry of the Filipino people? Basal-East Asian ancestry, as well as later Austroasiatic ancestry, from Mainland Southeast Asia, arrived into the Philippines prior to the Austronesian expansion. Austronesian-speakers themselves are suggested to have arrived on Taiwan and the northern Philippines between 10,000BC to 7,000BC from coastal southern China.

What nationality is a Filipino? Filipinos (Filipino: Mga Pilipino) are citizens or people identified with the country of the Philippines. Who ended slavery in the Philippines? The laws of the Indies, especially those promulgated in 1526, 1541 and 1588, prohibited and penalized slavery in all Spanish colonies. However, these laws were not effectively carried out and Philip II issued a royal decree dated August 9, 1589, ordering the emancipation of all slaves in the Philippines.

Why did America abandon Philippines? Why did the US give up the Philippines while they maintained all their other island territories? It was too far, too expensive to maintain and very hard to defend. Add to that the Filipinos had never given up their demand to be independent.

Why did America want Philippines? Throughout the country, expansionists insisted the United States keep the Philippines as a base for expanding trade and influence in the Pacific. Advocates of American naval power, like Roosevelt, argued that if the United States did not keep the archipelago, Germany or Japan would take it instead.

What happened with Spain and the Philippines? After its defeat in the Spanish-American War of 1898, Spain ceded its longstanding colony of the Philippines to the United States in the Treaty of Paris.

What was the economic impact of Spanish colonization in the Philippines? Agricultural Exploitation: The colonial economy was heavily reliant on agriculture, with Filipinos coerced into farming cash crops for export. How did the Spanish treat the Philippines? The Spanish hegemony in the Philippines altered the archipelago's existing social, economic, and political structures. Warfare and slavery expanded under Spanish rule, while women and transgender men, lost power within Philippine society. Finally, the Spanish colonization diminished indigenous voices.

What were the bad effects of colonization in the Philippines? One impact of colonization is “pyschocultural marginality” or the loss of one's cultural identity along with social and personal disorganization. Such impact is produced when people are denied access to their traditional culture, values and norms leading to historical trauma and cultural alienation (Dalal, 2011).

Who were Spaniards born in the Philippines? Spaniards born in the Spanish Philippines were called insular/es or originally filipino/s, before "Filipino" now came to be known as all of the modern citizens of the now sovereign independent Philippines.

What was the English language of the American colonization in the Philippines? When the Americans arrived in the Philippines in 1898, English was systematically promoted as the language that would “civilize” the Filipinos. It was the language that the colonizer introduced to the colonized so that the latter would be able to participate in a society determined by colonialism.

Did the Philippines gain independence after the Spanish-American War? The Spanish-American War and its aftermath delayed Philippine independence until after World War II, but established a relationship that fostered a substantial Filipino population within U.S. borders.

What major changes were brought about by American colonization in the Philippines? English was introduced as the official language; the education system reformed; port, rail, and road-building programs initiated; and war-damaged settlements rebuilt. Notably, Western architecture and urban planning forms were introduced as part of this “national development” process.

What is the old name of the Philippines? The Philippines were claimed in the name of Spain in 1521 by Ferdinand Magellan, a Portuguese explorer sailing for Spain, who named the islands after King Philip II of Spain. They were then called Las Felipinas.

What were the disadvantages of Spanish colonization in the Philippines?

The four factors OSHA recommends include management commitment and employee involvement, worksite safety analysis, hazard prevention and control, and safety and health training. These four broad categories can be further broken down into seven essential elements for health and safety practices in the workplace.

Is 350-1 training no longer required? Code of Conduct, Personnel Recovery or Survival Escape Resistance and Evasion Level-A (SERE-A) Training as defined in AR 350-1 and AR 525-28 are no longer required for all personnel. Commanders will evaluate individual missions or risks to personnel and may require this training if the circumstance dictates.

How long is the Army unit safety officer course? The Unit Safety Officer Course (USOC) is a combination of the Additional Duty Safety Officer Course, the Collateral Duty Safety Officer Course and the previous USOC into a new 20-hour course.

What is exempt from OSHA for the military? In accordance with Executive Order 12196, issued February 26, 1980, and 29 CFR Part 1960, military personnel and uniquely military equipment systems and operations are specifically excluded from OSHA coverage.

What is the Army regulation for safety? The Army Safety Program is based on Army Regulation (AR) 385-10 and is applicable to all Army personnel and operations. In the program, safety activities are organized to protect the force and enhance warfighting capabilities through a systematic and progressive process of hazard identification and risk management.

What indicates that the safety program has failed? Failure to identify or recognize hazards is frequently one of the “root causes” of workplace injuries, illnesses, and incidents and indicates that the safety and health program is ineffective. Hazard assessment can lead to opportunities to improve program performance.

How frequently will you plan to conduct unit safety meetings? OSHA requires any organization, big or small, to conduct safety meetings monthly or quarterly. Because humans are creatures of habit, you should make safety meetings part of your team's routine by scheduling meetings at the same time on the same day of

the month. They will soon come to expect them.

What is your responsibility as the unit safety officer? This position is responsible for assisting the Supervisor in implementing and managing the Safety Program within their department. This is an additional duty position. **ESSENTIAL DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES:** Coordinates the accident/incident reporting and investigation.

What are the 5 elements of safety? Whether you are developing HSMS, conducting a safety awareness workshop, or redesigning a general safety program, you must consider the 5 components of workplace safety: Education, Encouragement, Engineering, Enforcement and Evaluation. Let's break down each of these safety elements one by one.

Does the Army still do pov inspections? POV inspections prior to a long weekend or holiday are no longer required. All units have received transgender integration training, so it is no longer required.

What is the Army MRT regulation? MRT in Army regulations Personal growth is the ultimate goal. Army Regulation 350-1 mandates that all soldiers receive this training. Last year, as the Washington Examiner noted Tuesday, the Army stopped requiring soldiers to complete Accident Avoidance Course Training at the unit level, per a directive released by Army Secretary Mark Esper. The online course used to be required training every four years for any soldier operating Army vehicles.

What is the safe pass course? What is Safe Pass? Safe Pass is a mandatory safety awareness training programme for construction workers. It is a one-day programme that allows you to work on construction sites

without being a risk to yourself or others. Employers must make sure that employees on construction sites carry Safe Pass cards.
