**What are the three laws of reflection of light?** Law of reflection is defined as: The principle when the light rays fall on the smooth surface, the angle of reflection is equal to the angle of incidence, also the incident ray, the reflected ray, and the normal to the surface all lie in the same plane.

**What is the simple experiment of reflection of light?** Set up the compact light source with the card and slit in front of it, so that a thick ray of light splashes across the vertical white screen. Catch the ray with a piece of plane mirror held in the hand and reflect it across the screen. Bounce the rubber ball against a hard wall or floor to show its reflection.

**What objects transmit light?** Transmission of light Air, glass and water are common materials that are very good at transmitting light. They are transparent. because light is transmitted with very little absorption.

**What happens when a ray of light falls normally on the surface of a mirror?** When a ray of light falls normally on the surface of a plane mirror, the incident ray is reflected back along the same path. This is because the angle of incidence is zero, so the angle of reflection will also be zero.

approaches and disease management.

**How much did Step 2 CS cost?** Step 2 (Clinical Knowledge and Clinical Skills): The fees for Step 2 CK and Step 2 CS are separate. Step 2 CK costs around \$965, while Step 2 CS has a fee of approximately \$1,580.

**Is Step 2 CK pass fail?** Unlike Step 1, which is graded on a straightforward pass/fail basis, the Step 2 CK is graded on a scale of 1-300. In addition to a numeric grade, you will receive a supplemental report that breaks down how you performed on each content area. If you do not open every question block, your exam may not be graded.

**Can you retake Step 2 CK?** Yes, you can retake the Step 2 exam. USMLE specifies that you have up to four attempts to take any of their medical exams. This provides students with a Step 2 failure some time to study and retake the exam to have a passing score they can use to apply for residency programs.
