

# ANALYSIS OF THE ALLEGORY OF THE C

**What is the main message of Plato's Allegory of the Cave?** Plato uses the cave as a symbolic representation of how human beings live in the world, contrasting reality versus our interpretation of it. These two ideas reflect the two worlds in the story: the world inside the cave, and the world outside.

This means, of course, that those who still are uninformed will resist, since, after all, the cave is all they've ever known.

**What best identifies the main theme of Allegory of the Cave?** One of the central themes of the Allegory of the Cave is the search for truth and knowledge. The person who escapes from the cave represents the search for truth, and the journey out of the cave represents the process of discovering new knowledge.

**What is an example of a trade in value?** The term trade in value denotes the discount which a merchant is willing to offer as payment for property turned over as part of a bartering deal. For example, a car dealer may accept a used car as part of the payment for a new car.

**What is something of value exchanged for something else of value called?** Consideration is one of the six elements that make up a legally enforceable contract. It is something of value given in exchange for something else of value. A common example of consideration is money given in exchange for goods or services.

**What is the value of goods?** The value of goods used for customs purposes is usually the transaction value, that is the price actually paid or payable for the goods. This is the invoice price plus the cost of transport and insurance.

**What two things help determine something's value?** Scarcity and utility determine monetary value. Some necessities are useful but plentiful, so they may cost less than unnecessary goods and services that are very scarce and have utility.

by formal institutions of government, including laws; permanent territorial boundaries; and sovereignty (political independence).

**What makes a bank a state bank?** A financial organization known as a state bank is one that the state has incorporated primarily to offer commercial banking services. A state bank is not synonymous with a central or reserve bank, as both organizations focus mainly on influencing a government's monetary policy.

In the case of legal lending limits, state-chartered banks have a greater authority for secured lending due to the broader definition of what constitutes a secured loan.
